

## 10 Tips and Tricks for Middle School Success

- 5. Accept the invitation you receive to join your student's Google classrooms By accepting the invitation you can receive updates on assignments and announcements for each of your student's classes. You can choose how often, and how, you receive updates.
- 6. Check Skyward weekly with your student Skyward is the place where grades and any missing assignments will be listed. Skyward is the final say of this sort of information.
- 7. Encourage your student to use a planner system Writing assignments due dates down is vitally important for your student to keep track of what needs to be accomplished. This can be a paper planner or through the use of google calendar.
- 8. Ask your student what they have covered in class each day By going over what they covered in class you can have those conversations about what occurred each day. You should not hear "We didn't do anything today."
- 9. Encourage your student to self-advocate for themselves Middle School is a transitioning time between elementary school and high school. It is a safe place for students to begin to learn to let others know what they need. From asking questions of teachers when they do not understand to being able to speak up if they are experiencing any negative interactions with others, the earlier your student can learn to advocate for themselves, the more successful they will be when they move up to high school.
